# PERENNIAL POLYCULTURES: SUSTAINABLE, EDIBLE LANDSCAPES





### **Scott Allegrucci** | The Land Institute Dr. Claudia Ciotir | Saint Louis University

Scott Allegrucci will share TLI's work on perennializing grain, oil seed, and pulse varieties—the kinds of plants that make up much of our human diet—as an alternative to the current commodity crop agricultural model. This is not about integrating edibles into designed landscapes, but rather, about ecologically sound and resilient agriculture that can evolve beyond niche practices. Scott will be joined by Dr. Claudia Ciotir, postdoctoral fellow on the Perennial Agriculture Project Global Inventory.
