Seven different species of frogs and one species of toad have discovered these pools for breeding in the spring. See if you can see or hear them as you walk along this trail. Use the guide below to help you figure out the "WHO'S WHO?" in the amphibian world.

Singer		Song
Spring Peeper (.75 - 1.25")		sleigh bells or bird-like rising whistle
Bullfrog (3.25 - 6")		"chug-o-rum" in a deep voice
Southern Leopard Frog (2 - 3.5")		chuckle -like quacking
Cricket Frog (.6- 1.5")		metallic "gick, gick, gick" like the sound of small rocks be- ing struck together rapidly
Green Frog (2.5 - 3.5")		banjo string
Chorus Frog (.75 -1.5")		2 second vibrating "prrrreep", like running a fingernail over the small teeth of a pocket comb, with a rise at end
American Toad (2 - 3.5")		musical trill lasting up to 30 seconds
